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September passed in a flash for both students and staff as everyone got back into the routine of school. Students are now busy applying their knowledge to new curricular outcomes and are fully engaged in their classes and learning. Daily attendance plays an important role in supporting students in their learning. Good attendance is important for a child's ability to learn, grow and develop social skills. Attending school regularly helps children feel better about themselves and school. Missing 2 days of school a month or 20 days a year starting in Grade 1 is equivalent to missing a full year of schooling by grade 10! Please inform the school or your child's teacher if they are going to be absent. Fall weather is now here and we ask that you ensure your child is dressed for the weather. We go outside rain, snow or shine and only stay indoors when extreme weather is upon us. Daily outdoor play breaks promote curiosity, creativity and critical thinking in our students. Studies have found that children who spend more time in nature exploration have improved learning outcomes and demonstrate more positive behavior. Students look forward to both of their outdoor recess breaks each day and need to come dressed to enjoy this outdoor time during all of our seasons.

Grade 3 Science... that you can do at home!

Grade 3 A/B have both had a blast so far with the new science curriculum. We have been studying matter and have learned about all sorts of topics, from the various states of matter to how First Nations peoples found a use for every single part of a bison. We would love to share two science experiments that you can try at home using household materials.

Dancing Raisins: a study of solids, liquids, and dissolved gases

This experiment teaches us about a few concepts: buoyancy/density, states of matter, and the science of dissolved minerals and gases in carbonated water

Water Cycle in a Bag: How the earth's water is constantly on the move

This experiment lasts a while! By making a miniature atmosphere in a sealed bag, you can study what happens to water as it goes through the processes of evaporation and condensation (hopefully not freezing, but you never know).

Bonus: students also learned how to spot avalanches in the mountains. Keep your eyes peeled and snap a

photo if you spot one!
